Foster Care

- 42% of students in the foster care system do not graduate from high school, compared to 12% of all California students.¹
- 38% of children who have aged out of California's foster care system are unemployed at the age of 24.2
- 50% of children sold into **trafficking** in California are in the foster care system.³

Childhood Trauma

- 1 in 6 Californians have experienced severe childhood trauma—such as abuse, neglect, or violence at home—which is strongly linked to Serious health problems in adulthood.⁴
- A Californian with four or more Adverse Childhood Experiences is 12.96x
 as likely to have been removed from home as a child when
 compared to a person with no ACEs.⁵

Elementary School Attendance⁶

- 250,000 elementary students in California were **chronically** absent (absent for at least 10% of the school year) in the 2012–13 school year.
- 90% of elementary students in California with the most severe attendance problems are low-income.
- 24.9% of African American kindergartners and 14.2% of Latino kindergartners in California were chronically absent in the 2013–14 school year.
- 83% of chronically absent kindergartners and first graders in California are at **below-proficient reading** levels by the end of 3rd grade.

Dropout Risk

- Children who are **not reading proficiently** by the end of 3rd grade are **4x** more likely to **drop out** than proficient readers.⁷
- 53% of ninth graders who receive four or more **SUSPENSIONS** drop out of high school.⁸
- 39% of African American and 26% of Latino students have been suspended at least once, compared to 22% of White and 10% of Asian students.
- 82% of prisoners in America are high school dropouts.9
- High school dropouts cost California \$46 billion annually in decreased revenue and increased costs of social services.
