### The Three Pillars of ARC

- Acknowledgment
- Redress
- Closure




- "...recognition and admission of the wrong by the perpetrators or beneficiaries of the injustice."
- The culpable party engages in two step process:
  - A formal apology
  - A commitment to compensate the victims

### **Acknowledgment**

- The responsible party, the one that has done wrong, is said to be culpable. They must publicly state and admit they are aware of the harm they have done.
- Often, the responsible party refuses to admit the atrocities it has committed and acknowledgement does not happen (for example, Turkey's lack of response to the Armenian genocide).

## Redress: Restitution or Compensation

#### Compensation the U.S government already has given:

- Payments to Japanese Americans incarcerated during WWII
- Payments to families who lost loved ones during the 9-11 terrorist attacks (47 from California)
- Payments to victims of the Boston Marathon bombings
- Payments to those Americans taken hostage in Iran



### Japanese American Reparations Program

Roughly 120,000 Japanese Americans were interned in concentration camps in World War II

With the passage of the Civil Liberties Act of 1988, more than 82,219 Japanese Americans would go on to receive the uniform award of \$20,000





## Redress: One American Approach

In 2015, the Iranian hostages were awarded up to \$4.4 million each, or **\$10,000 per day** for the 444 days they were held hostage. This was the largest reparations payment to any individuals the US has ever paid.



At the same rate, compensation for a black American enduring a single decade of Jim Crow would be \$36.5 million

#### Closure

Achieved after an account is settled; a debt has been paid.

No more claims will be made on the responsible party by the victimized community as long as there is no renewal of atrocities and no new harms are inflicted.

## What Are Not Reparations (Our Perspective)

- Social Programs
- Affirmative Action
- Reversing harmful policies without also providing adequate compensation for their effects

## Reparations Cases for Other Groups Based on Past Atrocities in California

- Asian Americans
  - Chinese American Massacre in Los Angeles of 1871
- Native Americans
  - California gained statehood in 1850; "between 1849 and 1870 it is conservatively estimated that American colonists murdered some 9,500 California Natives"\*



- Family






### California Eugenics Program


- California's 1909 eugenics program was one of the earliest

### Reparations: Incomplete or Complete

Some countries have compensated people they have harmed without issuing a formal apology. Others have issued apologies without providing any compensation.

- Example of redress without an apology:
  - German payments to victims of the Holocaust and the state of Israel (1953)
- Apologies without commitments to redress:
  - Examples in Australia (2008), Chile (2013) and South Africa (1993)
- Example of redress with an apology:
  - Japanese Americans subjected to mass incarceration during World War II (1988)

## American Example of Apology Without Redress

#### Senate Concurrent Resolution 26 – 111<sup>th</sup> Congress (2009-2010)\*

- Acknowledges the fundamental injustice, cruelty, brutality, and inhumanity of slavery and legal segregation laws.
- Apologizes to African Americans on behalf of the people of the United States for the wrongs committed against them and their ancestors who suffered under slavery and Jim Crow laws.
- Expresses Congress's recommitment to the principle that all people are created equal and endowed with inalienable rights to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness, and calls on all people of the United States to work toward eliminating racial prejudices, injustices, and discrimination from our society.
- DISCLAIMER in Senate Resolution: Declares that nothing in this resolution authorizes, supports, or serves as a settlement of any claim against the United States.

### The Charge of AB3121 for an Apology


The Task Force will recommend how the State of California will "offer a formal apology on behalf of the people of California for the perpetration of gross human rights violations and crimes against humanity on African slaves and their descendants."

#### **AB 3121:**

### Task Force to Study and Develop Reparation Proposals for African Americans

The task force must address the following issues:

- Scope of culpability of the state of California, including ongoing policies that contribute to racial disparities
- Appropriate acts of atonement by the state of California
- Capacity of the state to implement acts of atonement
